Learning to Pray from the Psalms

- Daily reading one psalm each day
- Each week follows a particular category or theme of psalms
- Those selected are mostly prayers (i.e. 1st person expressions to God) or parts of each psalm
- Read the psalm and try to turn it into your prayer
- Fit it to your circumstances and concerns
- Direct your thoughts to God using the words of the psalmist with appropriate modifications



Prayer in the US (Pew Research, 2014)


Frequency of prayer


4 Key Presuppositions About Prayer

- 1. Man is in need of resources far beyond his ability to supply
 - 1 Ki. 3:7-10; Jer. 10:23
- 2. The One to whom man would pray is personal
 - 1 Pet. 5:6-7; Psa. 113:4-6
- Man is weak, and the object of man's prayers must be One who is a tender, compassionate and loving God
 - Psa. 34:15; 1 Jn. 5:14-15
- 4. If God is truly omniscient, man must submit to His divine wisdom in responding to our prayers
 - Eccl. 6:12

What is Prayer?

- An expression of our heart's desire unto God
 - Rom. 10:1
- An affectionate discourse between a child of God and their heavenly Father
- An act of faith
 - We cannot see God, but we know He is there, and He will act in response to our prayers
 - Heb 11:6
- By praying, we acknowledge our dependence on a Being higher than ourselves
- Prayer is not wishful thinking

God is not Santa Claus – just there to grant wishes



Nor should we be fatalistic – i.e. it doesn't matter if we pray



- **1 Timothy 2:1-2**
- Supplication
 - An asking or entreaty that grows out of a need
- Prayers
 - Communion with God devotion and worship; also, petition for personal needs
- Intercessions
 - To make petition on behalf of others
- Thanksgiving
 - The expression of gratitude and grateful praise to the Lord for His blessings

What is Prayer (cont.)

- Prayer is a spiritual activity. It is not a ceremony or just some rote habit.
 - Consider Daniel (Dan. 6:10)
- Prayers do not need to be long to be effective
 - Consider the publican (Lk. 18:13)

Whose prayer does God hear?

- A privilege and right of God's children
 - Mt. 6:9; Jn. 3:3-5; 1 Jn. 3:1
- He who worships God and does His will
 - Jn. 9:30-31; Prov. 28:9
- Those with 'holy hands'; purity of life and motive
 - 1 Tim. 2:8; Ps. 24:3-4; Isa. 1:15
- The privilege of one who is righteous
 Jms. 5:16; 1 Pet. 3:12
- Those who keep His commandments
 - 1 Jn. 3:22; 2:3

Whose prayer does God hear?

- Exception
 - The saved man who sins against God
 - Simon Acts 8:9-13,22
 - God knows we will not be perfect in obedience
 - Eccl. 7:20; Jms. 3:2; 1 Jn. 1:8
 - But God is merciful, and He will hear our pleas for forgiveness
 - 1 Jn. 1:9; Ex. 34:6-7; Ezek. 33:11; 18:21-24; Lk. 15:11-32
- What about Cornelius?
 - Acts 10:1-2

Importance of Prayer

- Prayer should have first priority in the Christian's life we must make it a vital part of our every day
 - Mt 7:7 "Ask … seek … knock" >>> intensity
- "Continuing steadfastly in prayer" (Rom. 12:12)
 Acts 2:42; 1 Thes. 5:17
- Jesus illustrated the importance and constancy
- Finally, when you think about our needs, our challenges, our failures ... why would we not want to pray to our compassionate Father?
